C.A.R.E. About Safety

Tornadoes occur throughout the year, but most frequently from March to September. Peak tornado season in Ohio is generally April through July, and they usually occur between 2 p.m. and 10 p.m. Last year, though, an EFI tornado occurred in Fairfield County at 6 in the morning - which proves that tornadoes can happen at any time, during any season.

Knowing what to do and where to go is critical. Licking/Knox Goodwill employees participate in tornado drills at all worksites every year.

There are two levels of tornado weather conditions:

Tornado Watch: indicates that weather conditions are favorable for tornado formations.

Tornado Warning: indicates that a tornado has actually been spotted or detected on radar.

When a Tornado Watch is issued, listen to local radio and TV stations for further updates. Also, be alert to changing weather conditions. Blowing debris or the sound of an approaching tornado may alert you. Many people say it sounds like a freight train.

When a tornado warning is issued, the affected County will activate a tornadowarning siren. People should take shelter and remain there until the danger has passed.





Have a Plan at Home, Work, School, and When You Are Away

Refore a tornado:

Know a safe place at home, work and at school. Locate local shelters and be aware of the tornado risk in your area. Practice tornado drills at home and school.

Have a plan for how family members will contact each another during an emergency. Establish an out-of-area contact (such as a relative or family friend) who can coordinate family members' locations and information should you become separated.

Make sure that children learn the phone numbers and addresses and know the emergency plans. Prepare a family Disaster Supply Kit. Families with children should have each child create their own personal pack.














been timed any better.

Contracts Spotlight: New Project

In January 2012, our Goodwill staff started custodial services at COTC for a facility called Ariel Hall located in Mount Vernon, Ohio. Starting a new contract is exciting but it encompasses a lot of coordination and exhaustive work. It also requires advanced planning and perfect execution. For Ariel Hall, there was another significant twist; the award of the contract came just days before the start date. Imagine putting together new staff and a plan of action during the week between Christmas and New Year's Day. This can only happen one way - using an amazing team!

With the help of a great Human Resource staff, we were lucky enough to find one crew member, Colleen DeVore, before the project began, but one position still remained empty. To cover this vacant position we located current employees, Donna Sparks and Joey Stephens of the Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA) contract, who were agreeable to assist us with the task of starting a new contract. To round out the crew, both Area Managers, Tom Gualtieri and Lisa Mulcare shared organizing the new project.

As we do with all new start ups, a few days before the contract started, the Area Managers and Contracts Director met with the COTC staff to have a pre-performance meeting. At this meeting we share information concerning the operational details of how we will work together. We ask questions such as who to notify incase of a fire and learn how to obtain such things as facility keys and security codes. Because of the late award of the contract, it was at this meeting that Lisa and Tom got their first tour of the campus and learned all of the details about the building.

One of the most difficult parts of this contract work was the hours. The customer stipulated that we were not to start work until 10:00 pm. This is when Tom. Lisa. Donna. and Joey normally prepare for bed and all four also work daytime hours. Donna and Joey start work at ODA at 7:00 am, while Tom and Lisa juggle their day and night hours to oversee their assigned contracts and meetings.

January 3, 2012 and the next three weeks, were long days for all. On the first day of the contract at Ariel Hall Lisa began early ensuring all office items and legal posting were ready to be placed at the new contract site. At 9:30 pm, the crew arrived and training began as we settled into a long night's work. For the next several weeks, the four Goodwill employees shared the duties to keep this site going. This required Donna and Joey to work from 7:00 am to 3:30 pm then from 9:00 pm to 3:30 am. For Tom and Lisa, it required working seven days a week. Two weeks in, the learning curve for Colleen well under control and the team began to share responsibilities. Colleen was a fast learner and fit in well with the team. In March 2012, the final employee, Lisa Arndt, was hired and has since been trained.

Thanks to such a wonderful team and a great new customer. These folks exemplify what a perfect team is all about.
